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

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Winter Park Home Gets the Redo It Deserves



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ometimes all it takes is a sensible update to give a home a welldeserved boost. Take Michael and Sydney Green's Winter Park home, for instance. Located in Sevilla, the Greens considered this an ideal location they were unwilling to relinquish. Space was not a problem either. With 3,500 square feet, the home gave Mike and Sydney all the comfort they wanted. But the twostory 70's home was showing its age, and that didn't agree with the Greens.

Having friends and acquaintances who had used PSG Construction, the Greens called PSG and found it wouldn't take a grand makeover to turn their home into something they could be excited about again and eager to share with family and friends.

Since the Greens were happy with the master bedroom suite that had been added just ten years earlier, PSG

The kitchen was dated, cramped and inefficient. By gutting the kitchen, low soffits could be eliminated and the ceiling could be raised to visually expand the area.

Construction concentrated on updating the kitchen and two guest bathrooms.

The kitchen was gutted, the low, seven-foot soffits and a bulky header over the bay window were eliminated, and the ceiling was raised to eight feet by concealing duct work in the trusses. A new tile back splash, richly lacquered cream cabinets, granite countertops and stainless steel

appliances replaced the worn products. Raising the ceiling and selecting lighter-colored finishes produced a kitchen with a more open, spacious feel. Interior designer Laurie Malmberg selected product finishes and coordinated the kitchen layout to maximize usage of floor and cabinet space.

Harbour Island Renovation Reflects Couple's Enthusiastic Approach to Life

Then retirement is at hand, the common trend is to downsize. But contrary thinking led Bill and Yvonne Austin to purchase a Harbour Island home they had their eye on for several years, then complete a 4,320 sq. ft. whole house renovation that raised the ceilings to soaring heights, brought the southern sunlight inside, and created fascinating features at every turn. Now the five-bedroom, four-bathroom home with four-car garage is ready for the Austin's congenial lifestyle.

"Many of our friends are young and have children," Yvonne says. "We didn't want them to stay in a hotel when they come to visit. We want to fill the house up!"

Yvonne is adamant when she says, "Why should we shortcut our lives or curtail our lifestyle just because there's just the two of us?"

Property Location Was a Priority

"The location and setting was most important to us," Bill explains. "We had been watching this location for about four or five years. We were hoping that something we liked would go up for sale."

Their scouting paid off. When the Harbour Island home was listed, the Austins determined that it had the potential for the openness they wanted.

The 1980's California contemporary was a dark cedar two-story that was in great need of updating. To transform the rambling home that would become their Remodelors' Showcase entry for 2000, PSG Construction teamed with Lucia Custom Home Designers. They added 406 sq. ft. of family room and master bedroom space to the original 3,914 sq. ft. home, for a total of 4,320 sq. ft. Additionally, a laundry room and second two-car garage was added.



A Challenge to Lighten, **Brighten and Expand**

Although the exterior style was to remain, the rough-sawn cedar exterior was dark and unimpressive. To lighten and give new life to the exterior, PSG first repaired rotted siding, then whitewashed the cedar and added cultured stone accents to the chimneys to mimic the grand cultured stone fireplace wall in the great room.

Extensive structural changes

opened the house in the manner the homeowners were after. One challenge, however, says Karen Kassik of Lucia Custom Home Designers, was to maintain the original style of the house in the new spaces, so that they would appear original. To meet this challenge, the front entry roof was raised to visually open up the house and beckon natural light inside. The entry doors were also relocated to provide a clear view from the foyer to the rear of the house. The back wall of

the house was also extended and the entire wall was replaced with Andersen® sliding glass doors leading to the resurfaced pool and 1,600 square foot wood deck spanning the entire width of the home. From here, the Austins have a precise view of the gazebo that seems to be suspended over the backyard pond.

In the great room, the massive stone fireplace and pine wrapped beams present a very approachable style. A favorite stone owl carving of

To remedy the problem of a small kitchen, the area was expanded into the existing laundry room area and a new laundry room was added. The oven, range and range hood is set in the same cultured stone as the great room fireplace and exterior chimneys.

The kitchen also showcases Canadian pine cabinetry custom-built in England. In order to preserve the original intent of the cabinetry and its design, the cabinetmaker was brought to the Orlando home from England to personally assist with installation of the cabinetry.

Elevator Increases Accessibility of Second Story

The second floor is accessed by way of a residential-grade elevator as

well as an imposing staircase enhanced with an iron and wood stair rail. The stairway is suspended and supported from the ceiling. From the staircase landing, a breathtaking view can be enjoyed of both inside and out.

"We liked this house because we knew we could put in an elevator," Yvonne explains. "This is going to be our last house, so I wanted an elevator."

The second-floor master bedroom suite features a sitting room with a separate office cozily tucked behind the sitting room. The inefficiently designed master bath contained very limited closet space. Lucia Custom Home Designers redesigned the bathroom within the existing space to maximize its efficiency. Attic space above the existing garage was borrowed to add a new walk-in closet for the master suite. continued on page 10

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Right on the Water

Addition Solves Challenge of Limited Space

"family center" was what this young couple wanted. As Aphysicians, the husband and wife were intent on keeping their family at the center of attention when at home. Even though the couple knew they would invest in some sort of addition, they didn't think they could get what they really wanted because of the configuration of their space.

Their existing family room was limiting, to say the least, and didn't give them the "hub" they needed when they were together.

The husband came to PSG Construction with preconceived ideas of how they could expand their existing family room, but considered its limitations to be nothing more than a "boring box."

The challenge was that little distance existed between the exterior wall of the family room and the outdoor pool. The husband was open to suggestions.

PSG Construction showed the couple that if they pushed the addition out to the edge of the pool, they could get the spacious "family center" they

really wanted. They would also gain the stunning effect of being directly on the water.

The existing french doors leading from the family room to the pool area were removed and the exterior wall of the new "family center" was fitted with a 24-foot expanse of butt glaze glass that showcases the pool. A planter filled with tropical foliage runs along the edge of the pool and four fountains release rhythmic cascades of water into

bathroom with bead board wainscoting, pedestal sink, shower, and storage closet. Also part of the project, a handsomely designed stucco retaining wall with cast stone cap deters potential water or dirt build-up in the pool area.

screen enclosure, and installed brick pavers around the pool's perimeter.

1500 sq. ft. Guest Suite Encourages Visits from Children and Grandchildren

Above: The homeowners knew their Lake Berry property was actually more valuable than the existing home. They wanted to make the most of the desirable location with a home that was equally matched. The three grown daughters and a handful of grandchildren, homeowners Joe and Margaret Simonds wanted to encourage frequent family get-togethers, but wanted more space to make everyone feel at home.

To carry out the Simonds' plan, PSG Construction teamed with Lucia Custom Home Designers to gut the 1,970 sq. ft. three-bedroom, two-bathroom home built in 1962. The design/build team then added 2,738 sq. ft. to create a 4,708 sq. ft. four bedroom, $4^{1}/_{2}$ bathroom home guaranteed to keep the children and grandchildren from feeling cramped.

During the holidays, the 1,505 sq. ft. guest quarters were put to the test. Occupying the entire second floor, the guest quarters include a living/play

area, three storage closets totaling 170 sq. ft., and two bedrooms, each with an adjoining bathroom.

"At Christmas I had 23 people sleeping here, and I never knew where anyone was!" Margaret Simonds proudly reports.

The upstairs is accessed by stair-case or elevator, but the Simonds have no need to venture upstairs, since the first floor is designed with master bedroom, an additional bedroom, office, den, living room, family room, workshop, and expanded kitchen. The double-door entry is positioned to impart a serene view of Lake Berry at the back of the house. Creating a beautiful frame for the view are two sets of white columns and a gentle archway.

In the kitchen, custom-made maple cabinetry extends across three walls for unlimited storage.

"I love my kitchen!" Mrs. Simonds says happily.

Also unique to the home are the numerous built-ins hand-crafted by PSG's cabinet-maker: a computer center in the office, storage center in the hall, floor-to-ceiling built-in located in the den, and corner cupboard in the dining room.

The Simonds' home now does double duty to provide a comfortably subdued environment when it's just husband and wife; but in a moment's notice, can accommodate a house full of memories in the making. **PSG**


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



Guatemala Orphanage Aided by Stephen Gidus


Brother Paul Gidus Builds a Home for the Poor in Mexico

guard stands watch day and night over The Hogar Rafael Ayau Orphanage, located in one of the toughest parts of Guatemala City.

The orphanage is operated by the nuns of the Monasterio Ortodoxo Lavra Mambre, and operates solely on donations. The 150-some children in the only Orthodox Christian orphanage in Guatemala are wards of the orphanage because of abuse, neglect, no trace of their parents, or mothers and fathers who simply cannot provide for them.

PSG Construction partner Stephen Gidus spent nearly three weeks at the orphanage in the summer of 2000, assisting with a summer camp for the children. Trips are organized by the Orthodox Christian Missions Center in St. Augustine, Florida.

One orphan named Henry soon became Stephen's regular companion. About seven years old, Henry would wait for Stephen at his dormitory entrance. They would often take meals together. When Samuel, another orphan, first met Stephen, he shyly hid his left cheek against his shoulder. He was embarrassed by the ugly scar his father left when he attacked him with a hot iron. Once Samuel saw that Stephen



was not interested in how he looked, he no longer hid his face.

"One thing we learned," Stephen says, "is that you don't go on a missionary trip with any expectations or your own agenda. You go to serve and do whatever you're asked to do."

Stephen's brother and PSG partner Paul was building a home

for a poor family in Mexico during this time. This was Paul's third year volunteering for Project Mexico. Paul learned that it is not necessary to travel to another country to perform acts of mercy.

"Our leaders on the building team encouraged us to come back home and continue doing acts of mercy for people here," Paul says. "They pointed out that it could be something as simple as working in a soup kitchen or driving an elderly person to church."

The Gidus brothers encourage others to consider missionary or charitable work. "Special skills are usually not necessary," Stephen explains. "The most important thing to have is a willingness to help out. Actions speak louder than words."
